Dear RMS-CES families,

As I interacted with many families last night at conferences, I'm reminded just how supportive our families are here at Rockford Middle School. I'm grateful to have the support of amazing parents who consistently help to navigate and guide their child through the unique challenges of the adolescent years.

A large part of the middle school years is being able to gain independence. Sometimes in the journey of gaining independence students experience setbacks along the way. As we end quarter two in the coming days, this is a great time to have students declare their goals, create steps to accomplish their goals, and then monitor their progress. These skills can be difficult for middle schoolers to navigate at this developmental stage, and even if they don't really admit it, they appreciate the helping guidance of trusted adults to be able to point them in the right direction.

People matter! During the middle school years, students focus predominantly about finding who they are as an individual and how that they fit in different social circles. As these friendships change, it's important that we continue to promote valuing others through concepts like kindness, compassion, and tolerance while avoiding devaluing others through behaviors such as bullying and harassment with unkind words or actions. If your child were to experience any loss or change of friendships during the middle school years I think it is very important to take the time and ask how they intend to treat the old friend in the future. This not only creates opportunities to build respectful interactions, but also leaves open a door if students wish to re-establish friendships in the future.

On Wednesday of this week when a student was walking into school on our two hour late start a student asked me "Mr. Warzecha, why are there so many snowstorms this year?" This made my day. One of the brightest lights I get to see is the genuine curiosity of middle school students. Oftentimes the simplest questions lead to the richest learning opportunities. I encouraged the students to explore that question by perhaps looking into some weather data to see how this year is similar or different to years past. This simple question can lead to so many connections with all content areas. It was truly a great reminder of just how impressive middle school students can be when they are authentically curious and take the time to explore possibilities in order to discover new understandings.



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SPARK 2023

After a crazy winter weather reschedule, a group of 5th and 6th grade student applicants had the opportunity to attend a student conference called SPARK, hosted by Resource Training and Solutions. Our thirty students joined 8 other districts on the St. Cloud State University campus where they attended a variety of science and nature topic presentations and hands-on learning experiences. Sessions ranged from How we get to Ice Cream: Milk production & Ice Cream manufacturing, ESports, It's not magic, It's STEM, to How to Practice Math by Folding Origami. Students participated in four 60 minute sessions, out of 20 possible sessions that were exciting and educational. Sessions were led by professionals in their fields such as paleontologists, entomologists (insects), or civil engineers. This was an opportunity brought to 5th and 6th grade through our Excel Gifted and Talented Program and funded through the Education Foundation. The purpose of the conference is to introduce students to a variety of scientific and natural elements to inspire their natural interests and talents in the field. The group experience was provided to students who show an intense and advanced interest in science topics.





Next Stop... the Regional Spelling Bee!



On Tuesday, January 10th, 34 5th through 8th grade students displayed their spelling abilities in the district-level spelldown. After a suspenseful 6 rounds going head to head with fellow 7th grader, Grace Oluwafemi, Imani Gladney secured a win in the 18th round, reigning as our 2023 RMS-CES Spelling Bee champion! Imani's winning word

was "elude," meaning "to avoid slyly or to evade." Our 2nd place contestant, Grace Oluwafemi, ended with the word "illimitable." Our 3rd place contestant, Kaia Seevers (8th Grade), ended with the word "marauding" in the 12th round. Congratulations Imani! 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8TH GRADE SOCIAL STUDIES-MR. RILEY

This week Eighth Grade Social Studies Historians let the creativity flow as they worked on a personal **Coat of Arms** that would represent them in battle. They discussed how fun peasant life could be in the "Dark Ages." The peasantry might wake up to start work with the sun at three in the morning, and after being required to give much of their crops, products, or materials away to vassals, have nothing to show for it. They also designed a castle that they hoped would protect against a siege. Students are focusing on methods of government, and how historical ideas of Democracy,







Republic, and Feudalism carry over to today due to geography.

5TH GRADE SOCIAL STUDIES-MS. MILLER


This week in 5th grade Social Studies, we started our Colonization Unit. Students have spent the week learning about the journey from Europe to America, some of the earliest settlements of the Americas, and the importance of farming and



agriculture in the lives of colonists. We will continue to take a deeper look at other colonies and important historical figures as we progress through our unit.

Students also had the opportunity to complete a STEM Challenge by creating their own model of a colonial plow. They learned about why farming and technology like plows were important to the survival of the colonies, and discussed how these

technologies worked. In small groups, students worked together to brainstorm, hypothesize, and draw out their own models of a plow before creating a model with their group. I enjoyed watching their creativity shine! Many students have expressed interest in engineering, and loved the design-and-build aspect of this STEM Challenge.
